Computer programming is not something one should be even slightly interested in... unless you're an Angry Granny!



The Townsville U3A Computer Programming class has just published its first app on the Apple App Store with the Google Play Store version soon to follow. It's a Sudoku-type game with a twist: although you can play the traditional numbers version, we wanted players to go beyond that and play using various icons instead. The idea is that, by ringing the changes, players would be further challenged by learning to deal with different visual symbols. So, we have animals, musical instruments, opera singers, butterflies and seashells, with more to come. Our team hopes that this innovation will not only be more fun but would add a further element of 'brain-training'.

Currently there are two class members who have been learning since February 2025. We started right at the very beginning and within a few months had made a simple game. Learning to programme is very similar to learning a language, except that programming only has about a dozen key words! The main difference is that programmers invent their own language as they go along.

Imagine you were to write down the steps in making a cup of coffee. You then give that set of instructions a name, like 'make coffee', and then every time we wanted to use those instructions, we would just use our new 'word' – make coffee. So, it's about breaking a task down into small parts and working out how to make the computer do that named set of instructions, using the aforementioned 12 key words. Much easier than you'd think, but just like learning a language, it takes some work!

Why 'Angry Grannies'? It's a bit of a misnomer – we're sweet old folk, really! It came about because in our first game you had to be very quick and it gave the impression of being a bit angry. That game has long been shelved. Also, computer programming involves a lot of frustration when the computer doesn't do what you think it should be doing!

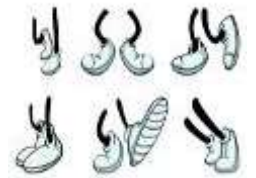
